	Trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit and remain satisfied that the purposes of the charity, and the way they have been undertaken, deliver public benefit. Remembering Not to Forget began the process of applying to be a registered charity at the end of 2015, we received confirmation from the Charity Commission of our registered status in April 2016.
Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)	The main activities undertaken during the year have been a series of fundraising challenges and events undertaken by trustees and volunteer fundraisers. The trustees were very grateful to be approached by Sackers Law Firm who selected Remembering Not to Forget as one of their charities of the year. The progress of these challenges has been communicated through regular newsletters and a website (www.rememberingnottoforget.org.uk) that have also profiled information about dementia in order to raise awareness of the issues for which funding is being sought. In addition, trustees have blogged to share their experiences of dementia to further raise awareness and create connections with others. Social media has been used to share these communications more widely.

Grants are made to organisations for activities in line with our charitable objects, outlined above. Grants reflect priority areas for the organisation such as supporting younger people living with dementia and research. Additional grants were approved and paid in the year from 2016 fundraising as follows, taking the total of 2016 grant payments to $\pounds 15,575$:

- Brace: £3,500 which has been used to help fund the cost of buying a new freezer for the South West Dementia Brain Bank
- Reminiscence Learning: £1,000 to support a dementia awareness project in a primary school and fund community sessions for older people, those living with dementia and their carers in Somerset
- Reading Agency: £1,075 to fund a mailing of 10,000 leaflets to 100 dementia healthcare professionals and organisations in South West England, to raise awareness of the 'Reading Well Books on Prescription for dementia' reading list. The cheque was issued 19/12/16 and cashed on 20/02/17.
